Macedonia and Thrace

This volume brings to fruition a long and valued collaboration with colleagues at the Centre for Greek and Roman Antiquities, the National Research Foundation of Greece (K.E.R.A.), under the direction of M. Hatzopoulos, who has generously authorised access to the resources of the Centre. A. Tataki read and commented on all the files covering Greek Macedonia; L. D. Loukopoulou and S. Psoma and their colleagues made available to us an advance version of their forthcoming corpus of Aegean Thrace, at some cost to their own work schedule. For Macedonia within the former Jugoslavia, we have received much needed guidance on topographical and many other matters from M. Ricl, who has also allowed us to draw on her knowledge of unpublished material in Belgrade.

A. Avram has collaborated for several years over the material from this region. More recently he has read and commented on our files from the whole Black Sea region.

Black Sea coast

Throughout the 1990s, J. Vinogradov was an active collaborator, examining all the files of the colonial cities on the north Black Sea coast. Numismatics

We have benefited from the collaboration of W.
