North Coast of Asia Minor

We owe a special debt to A. Avram who continued his collaboration begun for *LGPN* IV on the material from the Black Sea region. He has not only generously put his prosopography of this area at our disposal, but has also spent a considerable amount of time checking, correcting and adding to our collection of personal names derived from the amphora stamps of Herakleia Pontike and Sinope,

material which cannot easily be assimilated by the non-specialist.

C. Marek has provided us with his valuable database of inscriptions of the north coast of Asia Minor. D. Dana shared with us his unrivalled knowledge of personal names of Thracian and/or Bithynian origin. Several articles in *Gephyra* 4 (2007) were made available to us before publication by J. Nollé and J. Stauner.

Troas

M. Ricl, with her intimate knowledge of the area of Alexandreia Troas, has been responsible for the compilation of the names from the Troad.

Mysia

- G. Bowersock generously gave us access to the epigraphic material collected in and around Kyzikos by Louis Robert, especially from ancient Daskyleion. Among the latter's notes, squeezes and photographs, which are now kept at the Archives du Fonds Louis Robert de l'Académie des Inscriptions et Belles-Lettres in Paris, there are numerous unpublished inscriptions, from which we have been allowed to extract the personal names. These are cited as 'Unp. (Fonds Robert)'.
- D. Papamarkos allowed us to consult an unpublished paper on the decree of Apollonia in favour of Mardonios, attributed by L. Moretti to Apollonia Pontike and by L. Robert to Apollonia on the Maeander. We concur with the author in believing that it more probably refers to Apollonia on the Rhyndakos in northern Mysia.

It has regrettably not been possible to take up the generous offer of E. Schwertheim allowing us access to his archive of unpublished inscriptions from Kyzikos and its periphery.

Lydia

M. Ricl has had the prime responsibility for the compilation of the large number of personal names from this complex region. H. Malay, particularly through his collaboration with Ricl, has made available to us many personal names from inscriptions discovered during his research in Lydia which are as yet unpublished, as well as a smaller number from other regions. The majority of these are cited simply as 'Unp. (Malay)', but some are cited with a reference to a museum (e.g. Unp. (Manisa Mus.)). He has also been generous with advice based on his unrivalled and intimate knowledge of the region, especially on problems of historical topography. The late P. Herrmann also communicated a number of unpublished texts to Ricl which are duly recorded under his name. G. Petzl kindly made the text of his edition of the inscriptions of Philadelpheia and its territory available to Ricl in advance of its publication in 2007 as TAM V (3).

Ionia

- J.-L. Ferrary has generously provided us with, and subsequently revised and verified, exhaustive lists of the people attested in the records of foreign delegations to the oracular shrine at Klaros in the second and third centuries AD, pertaining both to the local sanctuary officials and the delegates themselves. This important body of inscriptions will be published shortly by him as Les mémoriaux de délégations de Claros (cited here as Ferrary, Mémoriaux).
- W. Blümel put at our disposal the text of the new corpus of the inscriptions of Priene to be published by him and the late R. Merkelbach.
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- A. W. Johnston made available the personal names of probable Ionian origin found among the graffiti on pottery from Naukratis, collected in the course of his revision of the entire corpus of this widely dispersed material.

Numismatics

Names recorded on coins have made a larger contribution to the present fascicle than any of those that have preceded it. In this specialised area we have depended heavily on experts in the field for providing lists of names as well as for more general advice. The greatest debt is owed to P. Kinns who has been responsible for assembling the vast body of names derived from the Classical and Hellenistic coinage of the cities of Ionia, much of it drawn from obscure sales catalogues and Fixed Price Lists, as well as from unpublished collections and market sources. Through Kinns' good offices we have also been provided by Ö. Tekin with the names attested in an important unpublished hoard of third-century coins of Magnesia on the Maeander. This material (cited here as 'Unp. (Tekin, Magnesia hoard)') will be presented by Ö. Tekin at the International Numismatic Congress in Glasgow, 2009 in a paper entitled 'The Magnesian hoard: a preliminary report'.

For other regions, R. Ashton has provided the names from the coinage of Kyme, Abydos, Lampsakos and Kios. He also did much to improve and supplement our coverage of the names attested on coins from the cities of Lydia. W. Stancomb contributed the names from the emissions of Amisos, Sinope and Kalchedon. F. de Callataÿ provided us with a draft of an unpublished, detailed study of the fourth-century coinage of Sinope.

C. J. Howgego was responsible at a much earlier stage for the names on the imperial coinage of Asia Minor and the project has subsequently benefited from the advice and help given by staff of the *Roman Provincial Coinage* project in Oxford, in particular V. Heuchert. At a late stage W. Leschhorn sent us a list of names on coins from Asia Minor. We would also like to thank M. Amandry for his willingness to verify readings of names on coins in the collection of the Cabinet des Medailles, Bibliothèque Nationale in Paris.

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
